



PE and Sports Premium

'The PE and sport premium is designed to help primary schools improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils.' (DFE September 2014). It is calculated on the number of pupils in Year 1 to 6. During 2015 to 2016 we received £5298 at Northrepps and £8160 at Erpingham as additional funding to continue the development of high quality PE and games teaching and learning.

Pupils from reception to year 6 worked with teachers from each school. Money was spent employing a specialist teacher of gymnastics for a year to deliver high quality gymnastics lessons. The money provided career development opportunities for staff in P.E. teaching.

Mrs Rowe and Mr Richards, our sports coaches this year will work with our teachers to provide high quality PE lessons. Mr Richards also runs an after school clubs at both schools. This is provided free of charge to parents.

For 2016 to 2017 the grant allocation is £8160 at Northrepps and £8,300 at Erpingham and will continue to enhance PE as described above. Erpingham VC Primary School & Northrepps Primary School. At Erpingham, we have been focusing on improving running, jumping, throwing and catching through athletics with class 2 and 3 and ball skills with class 1. Also, Mrs Rowe has been concentrating on playing competitive games with year 4s on a Tuesday which develops their ability to use attacking and defending skills.

At Northrepps, we have been focussing on basic movements with Acorn Class allowing the pupils to focus on developing their skills in running, jumping, throwing and catching, also developing their balance, agility and co-ordination through ball skills and games. Oak Class are currently focussing on a brand new activity in their PE lessons; Parkour. The pupils have been focussing on their skills to run and jump whilst developing their flexibility, strength, technique, control, balance and stamina.

Through PE, pupils are becoming critical thinkers and team players, being able to work as part of a team, taking on board other people's opinions and ideas. Their skills have improved in being competitive and learning about healthy lifestyles. They persevere; trying their hardest no matter what the odds are on whether they win or lose. This makes winning a bonus and pupils concentrate more on improving their own skills. Pupil skills in fairness have improved.

How have their skills improved? Pupils now have a better understanding of what PE is about and have started to show a positive attitude to learning and achieving to the best of their ability. Due to this, their learning progression has increased.

For Northrepps, the pupils' skills have improved this year due to the large variation as to what is involved in their PE. We ensure that all areas of the curriculum are covered. At Erpingham, pupils' skills have improved because of their embedded dedication to a varied PE curriculum. Pupils use what they have learnt in Forest School and apply it in activities in their PE lessons to complete activities.
