The children take turns to roll
2 dice and score a point each time they roll a double. The first to
reach 3 points wins the game.

doubles can they make? Can they make one
which is not a double and tell you why?

With your grown up, make a wooden

Set up an obstacle race in your garden or
inside. Have a race with your adult or time
yourself and try and improve on your timing.

Go on a summer bug hunt. Try
and identify all of the bugs you
find and list them.

Maths activity:

Show the children a bowl of strawberries. Explain that you are going
to share them into 2 equal groups so there will be half for you and
half for your friend. Put a handful straight onto each plate without
counting – make sure that one plate has much more strawberries
than the other. Ask the children if that is fair. Prompt them to show
you how to share the strawberries fairly.
