What I know about already:

- Britain's settlement by Anglo-Saxons and Scots
- the Viking and Anglo-Saxon struggle for the Kingdom of England to the time of Edward the Confessor
- a non-European society that provides contrasts with British history Mayan civilization (not 2020-21)
- changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age

What I will learn:

- an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066
- Consider changes in an aspect of social history, such as crime and punishment from the Anglo-Saxons to the present day
- Forces cogs and levers
- Light how it travels
- Electricity impact of different loads on circuits



bobbies/ peelers	Police officers, named after Sir Robert Peel, who introduced the first police force in London in 1829.
deterrent	To discourage someone from doing something.
execution	A sentence of death.
highwaymen	Criminals who would rob people while they were travelling. This was very common during the Stuart and Georgian periods.
humiliation	To make someone feel ashamed and foolish.
judge	Someone who is in charge of a trial in court.
jury	A group of people who would listen to the facts in a trial and decide if the person is guilty or not guilty.
ordeal	A long and painful experience.
treason	A crime against the King, Queen or the government.
victim	A person who has suffered.
trial	A judge and jury listen to evidence in a court to decide whether a person is guilty of a crime.

Challenges:

Make a slide show about a famous hero or criminal.

Create a junk model that has an electrical element - light, motor? or buzzer?

Record the life and times of a scientist in the field of light or electricity.

Investigate art from Anglo-Saxon times and have a go of one of your own.

Design a world where there are very different rules and make a 'book' of rules and the punishments for those not following them!

Key Concepts - Justice, Equality & Courage

Enquiry Questions:

Is everyone treated fairly? Are we kinder in the 21st century compared to the past? Should there be punishments? What makes something wrong? And if it's wrong, should it be illegal? Are all rules good rules? What's more important: doing the right thing or doing things right? What is the extent of freedom human beings should have? Do we change when we have power? Would this world be better or worse without the law?


